Southampton, England

Rich in maritime history, Southampton's attractions span the gamut of fine dining, outdoor life and a varied assortment of cultural offerings, including musical and theatrical performances. Dubbed the "Entertainment Capital of the South," Southampton has become alive with theatres, clubs, pubs, casinos and other entertainment venues. The city also prides itself on being the "greenest city in the UK." At the heart of the city are the historic Central Parks, which are now listed in the English Heritage's Register of Historic Parks and Gardens.

Brief History

In the first century AC, the Romans conquered part of southern Britain. They soon realized they needed an outpost at the southern tip of the river, so they built an outpost called Clausentum (Bitterne Manor). In the early 6th century the Saxons settled in the present areas of Chapel, Kingsland and St. Mary's.

In the 10th century, the area became known as Southampton, which was used to distinguish it from what is now Northampton.

Following the Norman Conquest in 1066, Southampton became the major port of transit between the then capital of England, Winchester, and Normandy. Southampton Castle was built in the 12th century and by the 13th century Southampton had become a leading port.

After William the Conqueror became King of England, prosperity and growth enhanced the area. The Normans began building a wall to encircle the town and in the mid-12th century, the Northern

gateway to the town was built. Churches began to appear throughout and Norman kings became regular visitors to the town.

Today, Southampton continues to be a major port for both trade and cruise ships. There is a Free Trade Zone and the main export is motor vehicles — most built at the Ford plant in nearby Swaythling.

Highlights

The Southampton Common, which is referred to as the "lungs of the city" is linked to the Central Parks by a tree-lined arterial road known as "The Avenue." The Common covers about 325 acres of land. Other city highlights include:

- Southampton Maritime Museum: tells the story of this important port and is also home to the Titanic Exhibition where visitors can re-live the ill-fated story of this famous ship, which sunk only five days after leaving Southampton on its maiden voyage.
- Southampton Hall of Aviation: depicts the history of aviation in the Solent area and tells the story of the legendary Supermarine Spitfire aircraft, designed in Southampton.
- Museum of Archaeology: this fascinating museum illustrates important periods in Southampton's history - Roman, Saxon and Medieval. Several of Southampton's archaeology collections are displayed within the museum.
- West Quay: the city's premier shopping center, making Southampton the top-shopping destination in the South of England.

Due to end of cruise accounting procedures, all accounts must be closed by 8:30am the morning of your disembarkation. Should you have any inquiries after you have settled your account, please ensure to contact the Guest Relations Desk no later than 8:30am the morning of your disembarkation. After this time we are not able to make any changes in your account.

Customs Allowances

Limits of Goods Bought in Ireland (EU) for your own use (Guidance Levels):

- 3,200 cigarettes
- 200 cigars
- 400 cigarillos
- 3kg of tobacco
- 110 litres of beer
- 90 litres of wine
- 10 litres of spirits

Banned and Restricted Goods

There are some goods, such as offensive weapons and illegal drugs that you can't bring into the UK no matter where you're travelling from. Other goods, like firearms, are restricted.

Some food and plant products may be restricted if they:

- Are not free from pests and diseases.
- Are not for your own use.
- Were not grown in the EU.
